LEGISLATIVE DAY 22 OF 40

Hello Partners! Welcome back to the [Night Owl](#) 🦉, your nightly recap of need-to-know information and intel on what's happening under the Gold Dome.

The activities at the Capitol offered a reminder that even in a sharply divided political environment, the work under the Gold Dome continues to shape the daily lives of Georgians in tangible ways.

The House paused to recognize Lupus Advocacy Day, with lawmakers wearing purple to elevate the voices of Georgians living with a chronic and often invisible illness. It was a powerful moment that centered public health and the real people behind policy debates. In a session often dominated by partisan fights, the recognition underscored the importance of investing in research, access to care, and support systems that families across the state depend on.

On the policy front, the House overwhelmingly approved legislation clarifying that drivers should pull to the right shoulder during traffic stops. Supporters argue the measure will improve roadside safety for both motorists and law enforcement. While straightforward in scope, the bill reflects a broader theme this session: how public safety proposals move quickly when there is consensus, even as other pressing issues like healthcare access and affordability continue to demand sustained attention.

Election governance remains a live wire. The Georgia State Election Board declined, for now, to take control of Fulton County's election operations, leaving open the possibility of future action. For many advocates, the decision reinforces ongoing concerns about state-level intervention in local election administration and the importance of protecting voter access and local control. With special elections approaching, trust in the system and transparency in oversight will remain front and center.

Meanwhile, conservation efforts saw meaningful progress as funding through the state's Outdoor Stewardship Program moved forward, directing more than \$30 million toward parks, trails, and land preservation projects across Georgia. Investments like these not only protect natural resources but also expand equitable access to green space and recreation, particularly in communities that have historically been under-resourced.

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

% of U.S. adults who say they get news from email newsletters ...




Majority of Americans who receive their news from newsletter don't end up reading it

% who have a(n) ... opinion of ...




Half of Americans have a negative view of the Trump administration
