LEGISLATIVE DAY 14 OF 40

Hello Partners! Welcome back to the [Night Owl](#) 🦉, your nightly recap of need-to-know information and intel on what's happening under the Gold Dome.

Lawmakers advanced a slate of measures touching education, public safety, community recognition, and budgeting as floor and committee work continued. The House approved its amended mid-year budget — a \$42.3 billion plan that replaces the governor's proposed income tax rebate with a one-time homeowner tax break and now heads to the Senate for further consideration.

Lawmakers also rolled out the **Georgia Early Literacy Act of 2026**, a bipartisan initiative aiming to fund a full-time literacy coach in every K-3 school to boost reading proficiency. On the public safety front, the House Judiciary Non-Civil Committee advanced **HB 1076**, which would elevate *blocking police with a vehicle* to a felony offense.

The House Education Committee green-lit a bill to allow weapon detection systems at public school entry points, pairing safety discussions with funding questions.

Cultural and civic engagement were on display with *Latino Day* celebrations at the Capitol, highlighting the growing political influence of the state's Latino community.

Meanwhile, lighter fare also emerged, such as a proposal to designate lemon pepper wings as Georgia's official state chicken wing flavor — a reflection of lawmakers' interest in symbolic and cultural recognition.

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

Migrant encounters by U.S. Border Patrol at the U.S.-Mexico border, by fiscal year






The Border Patrol recorded 237,538 encounters with migrants at the U.S.-Mexico border in the 2025 fiscal year, which began in October 2024 and ended in September 2025. That was down from more than 1.5 million encounters in fiscal 2024, more than 2 million in fiscal 2023 and a record of more than 2.2 million in fiscal 2022. The 2025 total was the lowest in any fiscal year since 1970, according to historical data from the Border Patrol.



[Majority of middle class Americans believe economic opportunities have been decreasing over the past years](#)

Financial differences between two classes of Americans reflect the widening gap between economic expectations. Majority (62%) of polled wealthy people believed that economic opportunities such as buying a house, getting a good job, and raising a family are increasing in recent years while the majority of middle class people (53%) believe these opportunities are decreasing.

Most Americans call shooting by ICE agent in Minneapolis an inappropriate use of force

Most Americans see an immigration officer's fatal shooting of Minneapolis resident Renee Good as an inappropriate use of force, a new CNN poll conducted by SSRS finds. Roughly half view it as a sign of broader issues with how US Immigration and Customs Enforcement operates, with less than one-third saying that ICE operations have made cities safer.

Georgia reported as the state with the highest layoff numbers in January

A report released on February 5th found Georgians received the most layoffs in the country with 31,415 jobs cut. This marks a 11,665.9% increase in Georgia layoffs in January 2025 (267 jobs cut) and the highest number of layoffs in January since the 2009 recession.
