LEGISLATIVE DAY 27 OF 40

Hello Partners! Welcome back to the [Night Owl](#) 🦉, your nightly recap of need-to-know information and intel on what's happening under the Gold Dome.

With Crossover Day just two days away, the pressure is rising under the Gold Dome as lawmakers scramble to move priority legislation out of their chambers. Committees churned through bills throughout the day, and the Georgia House remained on the floor late into the evening working through a packed calendar as leadership pushes to get key measures across the chamber line before Friday's deadline.

Earlier in the day, lawmakers also debated a proposal that would have eliminated property taxes in Georgia and replaced them with a higher statewide sales tax. The measure ultimately failed to advance, reflecting the steep fiscal and political hurdles attached to overhauling one of the state's primary funding streams for local schools and services. Critics warned the proposal could have shifted the tax burden onto working families through higher consumption taxes while threatening stable funding for education and local governments.

Meanwhile, the Senate advanced a bill framed by supporters as protecting political activity on college campuses, but one that critics say reflects the growing influence of national conservative organizing efforts in state policymaking. The legislation stems from an incident involving conservative activist Charlie Kirk and his organization Turning Point USA. Democratic lawmakers and campus advocates have raised concerns that the measure could create new openings for outside political groups to amplify partisan organizing at Georgia's public universities under the banner of protecting free speech.

The House also approved House Bill 295, sponsored by Athens Republican Rep. Houston Gaines, allowing property owners to sue local governments over policies related to homelessness and immigration enforcement. The measure passed 98-75 just ahead of the legislative deadline and now heads to the Senate. Critics argue the bill could deepen pressure on cities already grappling with housing instability and complex immigration challenges while shifting difficult policy questions from local governments to the courts.



[Conservative leaning, Heritage Action publishes poll in support of the SAVE America Act](#)


A poll conducted by Heritage Action reports that the majority of Georgians believe in the principle ideas presented in the SAVE America Act. While this poll reflects support, it is important to know who a poll is made by and for. Heritage Action is a conservative organization that taglines itself as a participant in the fight to “Restore America’s Promise.” In their nine policy priorities, Heritage Action cites securing the border, election integrity, education freedom, and

family/American First values as their core. This poll is presented in a way that aligns with Heritage Action's ideologies, creating a biased assessment of Georgian values regarding voting rights and the SAVE America Act. In addition to the organization's biases, this poll was conducted with a sample of 663 Georgians, 59% of whom were white, and 39% of whom identified as Republican.

Following U.S. and Israel backed airstrikes Iran a poll by CBS found that Americans don’t believe that the administration’s plan with Iran has been explained well enough (62%). Over half (56%) of the polled respondents disagree with U.S. military action against Iran with 45% of participants believing war with Iran will make America more unsafe overall.



Democrats want their politicians to focus on stopping Trump: A CBS poll on the 2026 primary season reports that Democrats want their politicians to firstly focus on stopping Trump (53%) and secondly focus on their policy issues (47%). When asked, registered voters were split on whether they wanted Democrats (45%) or Republicans (40%) to control Congress next year.
