LEGISLATIVE DAY 29 OF 40

Hello Partners! Welcome back to the [Night Owl](#) 🦉, your nightly recap of need-to-know information and intel on what's happening under the Gold Dome.

The Capitol returned to a slightly calmer pace today after Friday's chaotic Crossover Day sprint, but the policy fights that define the session are far from over. Lawmakers are now sorting through the legislation that survived the deadline and preparing for the final stretch toward Sine Die on April 2. Among the lingering debates are proposals around property taxes, data centers, and voting systems—issues that will directly shape affordability, transparency, and public trust in state government. Last week's late-night votes moved several high-profile bills forward, including measures pitched as tax relief, though economists and education advocates continue to warn that some proposals could drain revenue from local schools and public services if lawmakers fail to fill the gaps.

One of the clearest examples of that tension is the growing fight over Georgia's booming data center industry. Recent reporting has highlighted how lawmakers are considering changes to tax incentives for new facilities, while critics argue the proposals still fall short of protecting everyday ratepayers from potentially footing the bill for the massive energy infrastructure these developments require. Consumer advocates and Democratic lawmakers have increasingly raised concerns that, without stronger safeguards, Georgia Power customers could end up subsidizing billion-dollar corporate projects tied to the rapid expansion of data centers.

Meanwhile, some proposals quietly hit a wall after failing to secure enough support before the Crossover deadline. Efforts to legalize sports betting appear dead for the year after the House declined to advance a voter referendum, a reminder that even widely discussed policies can collapse when lawmakers fail to build consensus. As the session enters its final weeks, attention is now shifting to the legislation that remains alive, including consumer protections, tax policy, infrastructure, and education funding, while advocates continue pressing lawmakers to ensure the policies moving forward actually improve the day-to-day lives of Georgians rather than simply delivering wins for well-connected interests.




The February 2026 U.S. jobs report showed a decline in the labor market, with 92,000 jobs being lost despite economists expectations of an increase in employment for the month. The unemployment rate



rose to 4.4% from 4.3% in January with the total number of unemployed Americans reaching about 7 million. Some fields specifically took hits. Healthcare lost 28,000 jobs, the government was down 6,000 jobs, and information with 11,000 jobs lost. Despite the overall loss of jobs, wage growth saw a 0.4% increase in the month of February.

Americans think we're more bad than good: A survey across 25 countries found that Americans hold uniquely negative opinions of their fellow citizens. Of Americans, over half (53%) say the morals and ethics of other Americans are bad. The survey also revealed partisan differences with 60% of Democrats or Democrat-leaning respondents saying Americans are morally bad compared to the 46% of Republicans or Republican-leaning respondents.
