LEGISLATIVE DAY 30 OF 40

Hello Partners! Welcome back to the [Night Owl](#) 🦉, your nightly recap of need-to-know information and intel on what's happening under the Gold Dome.

Lawmakers returned to the Gold Dome Tuesday with the dust from Crossover Day still settling and attention shifting to what legislation might actually make it to the governor's desk. Housing affordability remains a growing concern, as advocates warn that corporate landlords continue to buy up single-family homes across the state. One proposal still under consideration would limit corporations from purchasing more than 500 homes beginning in 2027, an attempt to slow the expansion of Wall Street-backed investors in Georgia neighborhoods.

The political backdrop is also coming into sharper focus. Candidate qualifying is underway for the 2026 election cycle, setting up what is expected to be a crowded race for Georgia's next governor. With the cost of living, health care access, and housing affordability weighing heavily on families, these issues are likely to define both the final weeks of the legislative session and the campaign trail ahead.

Meanwhile, the Senate also passed legislation designating a new official state flower, a symbolic debate unfolding alongside far more consequential policy decisions. With only a handful of legislative days remaining before Sine Die, the real question is whether lawmakers will tackle the economic pressures facing everyday Georgians or continue prioritizing the interests of powerful industries.



A poll by Emerson College found that Georgians are swaying towards Democratic candidate Jon Ossoff over the respective Republican candidates Mike Collins, Buddy Carter, and Derek Dooley. Of voters, Ossoff holds a tighter base with women (12 points) and voters under 50 (8 points) than his Republican counterparts. When surveying Republicans, Emerson College

found that 1 out of 4 Georgia Republicans remain undecided on their vote for Republican U.S. Senate candidates, with Mike Collins following behind at 30%.

The US lost jobs in February and the unemployment rate increased to 4.4%.


Total non-farm employment in the US decreased in February, shedding 92,000 jobs.

The February 2026 U.S. jobs report showed a decline in the labor market, with 92,000 jobs being lost despite economists expectations of an increase in employment for the month. The unemployment rate rose to 4.4% from 4.3% in January with the total number of unemployed Americans reaching about 7 million. Some fields specifically took hits. Healthcare lost 28,000 jobs, the government was down 6,000 jobs, and information with 11,000 jobs lost. Despite the overall loss of jobs, wage growth saw a 0.4% increase in the

month of February.

Compared to a January poll where 89% of Americans felt that Iran was a threat to the U.S., Americans now disapprove of the emerging war with Iran. In a text survey of 1,004 adults, 77% of Republicans approve of U.S. military action compared to the respective 82% and 68% disapproval rates from Democrats and Independents. 6/10 polled respondents believe that Trump does

not have a clear plan in his approach to the attacks against Iran.
