LEGISLATIVE DAY 39 OF 40

Hello Partners! Welcome back to the [Night Owl](#) 🦉, your nightly recap of need-to-know information and intel on what's happening under the Gold Dome.

If Tuesday proved anything, it is that the final days of session rarely move in just one direction. Lawmakers spent the day advancing major legislation while also stepping into some of the session's most loaded cultural and political fights.

Alongside movement on voting, taxes, data centers, education, and the future of Quitman, the House floor debate over **SB 175** made clear that disputes over monuments are also disputes over memory, identity, and who gets to define the public story. Rep. Alan Powell's [remarks](#) in support of the bill, including his invocation of the Bible while speaking about slavery, gave the debate an especially charged tone.

The Senate also moved **HB 1116**, a property tax rewrite that would try to hold down homeowner tax bills by capping increases and authorizing a new local 1% sales tax for property tax relief. Supporters framed it as a way to give homeowners more predictable bills, while Democrats argued it would simply shift more of the cost onto renters and lower-income Georgians through higher sales taxes.

The General Assembly also delivered a rare moment of broad agreement on education. Speaker Jon Burns' literacy package, **HB 1193**, passed unanimously in the Senate after being amended and preserved the bill's core pillars, including literacy coaches in K-3 schools, state-vetted curriculum, and a stronger statewide push around the science of reading.

That legislation is now on a direct path forward and stands out as one of the clearest policy wins of the day.

Meanwhile, the House also passed an HOA oversight bill that would create a hearing process through the Secretary of State's office for disputes between homeowners and associations, while a bill to create standards for community health workers in rural and underserved areas appeared to stall after failing to pass Senate Rules.

Add in the Senate's movement on a proposal that would expand DNA collection for immigrants in custody on even low-level charges tied to ICE detainers, and Tuesday offered a familiar late-session mix of consensus in a few places and sharper ideological divides almost everywhere else.

And because no late-night session is complete without a bill surfacing at the eleventh hour, **SB 17** came up around **11 PM**, advancing a proposal that critics say could hand the state sweeping new authority over local governments. The "Red Tape" bill, which only began moving last week, would make major changes to the process for placing cities under receivership, and Democrats argued that something this far-reaching should not be rushed through in a matter of days. Sen. Josh McLaurin raised serious concerns about the harm and instability a receiver could bring to a city, arguing that legislation with this much impact deserves

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deliberate debate, not a late-night fast track. Sen. Jason Anavitarte also took aim at Hiram for partnering with Fair Fight, a reminder that even debates over local control are quickly being folded into broader political battles. In the end, the motion to agree to the House substitute to SB 17, as amended, was adopted 32 to 17.

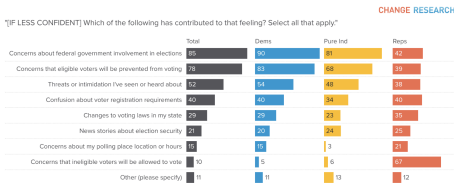

RESEARCH AND POLLING



Voters unsure about election integrity in lieu of the SAVE America Act: A

Change Research poll in March found that a number of Americans feel unsure about the Federal government's transparency in voter practices. When asked about the upcoming Congressional election only 14% of respondents felt confident that their votes would be counted accurately nationwide, with Democrats sitting at 37% not too confident or not confident at all and Republicans at 60%. When asked about their lack of

confidence the two highest answers were concerns about federal involvement in elections and fear that eligible voters will be disenfranchised.

High levels of concern are expressed across all age groups:

- Gen Z (1997 - 2008): very concerned (35 percent), somewhat concerned (43 percent), not so concerned (14 percent), and not concerned at all (7 percent);
- Millennials (1981 - 1996): very concerned (39 percent), somewhat concerned (42 percent), not so concerned (7 percent), and not concerned at all (10 percent);
- Gen X (1965 - 1980): very concerned (36 percent), somewhat concerned (43 percent), not so concerned (8 percent), and not concerned at all (10 percent);
- Baby Boomers (1946 - 1964): very concerned (39 percent), somewhat concerned (43 percent), not so concerned (10 percent), and not concerned at all (6 percent);
- Silent Generation (1928 - 1945): very concerned (31 percent), somewhat concerned (41 percent), not so concerned (15 percent), and not concerned at all (8 percent).

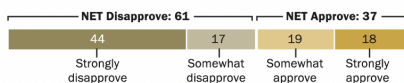
Americans believe AI will do more bad than good: A Quinnipiac

University poll from April researching public opinion on artificial intelligence found that since April of 2025 60% of Americans reported that they have never used artificial intelligence compared to 27% reported in the recent poll. Despite an increase in users over the past year, over half (55%) of those polled feel that AI will do more bad than good marking an 11% increase since April 2025. Of Gen Z, Millennials, Gen X, Baby Boomers, and the Silent Generation there is a general consensus that artificial intelligence is negative for the workforce with 7/10 Americans

believe that AI will result in less job opportunities in the future.

Nearly six out of ten polled respondents think the U.S. made the wrong decision with the U.S. military force in Iran and Over four in ten think action so far is not going well.
